Ittawamba Announces Centurions by Paylor Eubank

Four members of our Lodge were recent recipients of the Centurion Award in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the OA. We are proud of each of our recipients and all that they have done for the Lodge. Our Centurions are former Lodge Adviser Dr. Bob Carney, Section Adviser Jim Cheatham, former Lodge Chief Nick Varnick, and Lodge Chief Paylor Eubank.

Dr. Bob Carney has been involved in the OA since 1958. He became Ittawamba Secretary in 1959, the first Vice Chief in 1962, earned his Vigil and was Lodge Chief for two terms in 1963 and 64. As an adult, Dr. Carney continued to be involved with our Lodge as an Adviser for 35 years. He is also a Founder's Award recipient and earned the DSA in 1986. In addition to being involved with the Lodge, Dr. Carney is also the West Tennessee Area Council's Central District Eagle Board Chairman.

Jim Cheatham completed his Ordeal in 1993 and has been involved with the Ittawamaba Lodge since. As a youth member, Jim earned his Vigil in 1996 as Lodge Chief. He was voted the SR-6 Section Chief from 1997 until 2000, when he was the Southern Region Chief. Jim was the Ittawamba Lodge Adviser and Associate Section Adviser from 2009 through 2012 when he took the role as Section Adviser; a position he still holds. Jim has also been awarded the James E. West Fellowship Award, the DSA, and he is also a Founder's Award recipient.

Nick Varnick is the first of Ittawamba Lodge's youth award winners. Nick joined the Lodge in 2007 and earned his Vigil in 2011. He was voted in as a Lodge Vice Chief in 2011, became Lodge Chief in 2012, and held that position through 2014. Nick was awarded the Founder's Award in

2014. Nick is still very involved in the Lodge.

Current Lodge Chief Paylor Eubank was the second youth to earn the Centurion Award for the Ittawamba Lodge. Paylor went through his Ordeal in 2012. He was elected Lodge Secretary in 2014 and became Lodge Chief at the beginning of this year. He still plans to remain heavily active in OA.
